You see that there isn't anything more important that your life could be about, and whatever you end up contributing during the course of your lifetime is the most important and the most uplifting thing that you could possibly do. And yes, there are moments of great disappointment, but also moments of great joy as part of this...."

Magnify this example many times over. Consider how this could not only impact many thousands of prisoners, but how it could then radiate back outside the prison walls to youth trapped on the bottom of society and funneled off to prison in unprecedented numbers.
